

Thinking of Canada and Canadian universities?

Here's some useful information

Canada/India

- Population: Canada, 34 million; India, 1.1 billion
- Area: Canada, 9.9 million km²; India, 3.3 million km²
- Canada is home to over one million people of Indian origin

Commonalities

Canada and India are both geographically large and ethnically diverse federations, democracies and members of the Commonwealth with a Westminster parliamentary system. We have in common the English language, which is one of two official languages in Canada. *(The other is French.)*

Growing ties

- In June 2010, the prime ministers of India and Canada met in Toronto following the G20 Summit and signed

a memorandum of understanding on higher education cooperation. This framework will facilitate academic exchanges, partnerships and mobility between higher educational institutions in the two countries.

- The prime ministers also welcomed initiatives to link Canadian and Indian universities and colleges, including in curriculum development and the creation of chairs and centres for Indian studies at a number of Canadian universities.
- The Association of Indian Universities and AUCC signed an MOU committing to greater collaboration in 2008.
- Both countries share a longstanding academic relationship through the Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute.

Canadian universities perform more than one-third of the country's research. If you're thinking of research partnerships, think of Canada and Canadian universities.

Cutting edge

Every day, research institutes are being established and world-renowned research teams are setting up shop. Among the most active areas right now are health, nanotechnology, information and communications technology and sustainable energy.

Universities play key role in R&D

- Overall research expenditures in Canada are about \$30 billion Cdn (about 1.3 trillion rupees). Universities' research activities represent about approximately 36 percent of that - significantly more than other OECD countries.

- The university sector is the second-largest performer of research in Canada after the private sector.
- More than 70 percent of provincial funding for R&D is invested in universities.
- Most Canadian-based research in the social sciences and humanities – about 90 percent – takes place at universities.
- The Canada Excellence Research Chairs is a prestigious new program that has attracted some of the world's best researchers to Canada's universities.
- International research collaboration is widespread in Canada's universities - 40 percent of academic publications in Canada are internationally co-authored – double the world average.

This year, approximately 3,000 students from India are enrolled in Canadian universities. There's room for many more. If you are thinking of studying abroad or doing an exchange, think Canada and Canadian universities.

A quality education with a range of options

Canada offers high quality university education in a rich learning and research environment.

There are nearly one million full time students enrolled in Canada's universities. International students represent 8 percent of the undergraduate student population and close to 20 percent of the graduate student population.

Canada has both large and small universities, some at the heart of the

country's biggest and most vibrant urban areas; others are located in small cities with easy access to Canada's open spaces and natural beauty. Canadian universities offer safe campuses in a multicultural environment, along with innovative approaches to learning such as co-ops and research internships.

India: A priority for Canada

Canada's federal government is committed to strengthening Canada's ties to the global supply of ideas, talent and technology. To that end, Prime Ministers Harper and Singh signed the Canada-India

higher education Memorandum of Understanding in June 2010. Canada also signed a science and technology (S&T) agreement with India in 2005.

Investments are being made

- Canadian universities are investing great amounts in creating international partnerships that are mutually beneficial – academic exchanges, joint programming and international research collaborations.
- There are currently over 100 active academic agreements between Canadian and Indian higher education institutions.
- Under the Canada-India S&T agreement, the International Science and Technology Partnerships program provides funding for collaborative international research projects with the potential for commercial application.
